I want to bring to the attention of our community the uptick in motor vehicle accidents and hit and runs. We have a lot of vehicles, pedestrians, and bicyclists navigating our streets daily so it is imperative that you stay alert and exercise safety as you drive around campus. If you are involved in a crash, you must call the police regardless of whether you hit a car or a stationary object; or, the accident involves an occupied or unoccupied vehicle. If you leave the scene of the accident, it is a crime under Louisiana Revised Statute 14:100. Cameras are strategically placed throughout campus and are utilized to help solve these types of crimes. Don't take a chance at receiving a summons and large penalties. Instead, stay on scene and call 985-549-2222 if you're on campus. If you're off campus, contact the local police for that area.

In today's world, fentanyl is being put into everything, and just one dose the size of an ink pen tip can kill you. News coverage of overdoses and related deaths are at an all-time high. This is not because drug use has exploded, it's because of the types of drugs and the chemicals added to them. Please be mindful!

Hammond and Southeastern are not immune from the fentanyl issue. Drugs are illegal and you should not do them or experiment with them, but I am a realist and want to keep you all informed and safe. So, be aware of what you are taking or experimenting with. If you feel like something is wrong and you need help, call us immediately. Don't be afraid that you are going to get in trouble or be arrested. The top priority is making sure you are safe and not in danger of overdose and death.

The best way to not have to worry about this is by not doing it at all.
